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A Necessary course correction! by Marcus C. Grodi

When an ancient mariner on his first night out from a European port checked his sextant in the late evening and ordered his navigator to steer a slightly more northerly course, he did so not out of whim. He knew that a route but one degree off in the beginning might mean the difference between landing in Newfoundland, Boston or New York. We needed to make just such a correction.

The Coming Home Network began in 1993 with a very small mailing list and with very limited goals and dreams. At that point we had no inkling that seven years later we would have over 9400 members, a staff of six, a volunteer Helpers Network of over 150, and an annual budget of around three hundred thousand dollars. We also didn't anticipate that I would be hosting the Journey Home program on EWTN which is watched by an estimated eight million viewers around the world every time it airs-which doesn't count the hundreds of thousand potential radio listeners.

During these years, we have expanded our operation, our staff,

and our vision in response to the growth brought on by God's grace and your generosity and prayers. But several months ago the board and I recognized that we needed to make a major course correction. We were certain this was God's leading, but we didn't realize until we began implementing the plan how clearly this was from Him.

In 1996, my family moved from Steubenville to ten acres on Marilyn's old family farm. We built a house and from there I continued to direct the CHNetwork. However, the main office work-answering the phones, processing the mail, fulfilling orders, etc.-remained in Steubenville subcontracted to the Ridgefield Group (and I must say that their continued assistance has been and continues to be a godsend). Over the next few years we've gone through nearly a dozen secretaries and office assistants, most of whom were students at Franciscan University. When we hired Chris Erickson as director, we solidified our entrenchment as a divided-or virtual-office arrangement: they were in Steubenville and I was two hours away in Dresden.



In many ways this arrangement kept pace with our growth, and for this I extend my great appreciation to all who have served on our staff. But it became continually clear that as we envisioned where God was calling us to steer towards the future, we would need to bring the organization together under one roof. Several friends who direct Catholic nonprofit apostolates stressed that when the founder becomes separated from the foundation, the foundation flounders, and we were seeing the signs of this.

As a result, the decision was made in July that by the end of the year the offices of the CHNetwork would have moved here to Zanesville, so that the staff and I could work and pray together daily. These were our plans, but God's timing was slightly accelerated. I won't go through the myriad details, but as I write this in mid-September, the Steubenville staff have all followed open doors into either new jobs or better situations, and an entire new local staff has been hired here in Zanesville. It is hard to communicate how miraculous this has been, but trust me, I sit here still amazed by how providential, merciful, and generous God has been.

Let me tell you about Chris Erickson as an illustration. When I awkwardly

told Chris about our decision he agreed immediately. From his experience as our director for over a year, he was convinced that I needed to be closer to the staff operations. He wasn't sure, however, whether he could or should move his family, and I understood without pressure either way. While Chris was discerning this decision, Robert Smeltzer-a Catholic friend who owns the building where our offices are located and who has run his own businesses for over twenty years—startled me by throwing his hat into the ring for consideration as the

new director if Chris couldn't make the move. The next week as I prepared to tell Chris about Bob's interest, Chris cautiously informed me that he had been offered the job as Director of Communications for Catholics United for the Faith (CUF)—a position that fit his main interests and skills. With hindsight and joy we agreed that his time with the CHNetwork had been a blessed opportunity to hone his editing and writing skills specifically for this new job with CUF.

As far as the rest of the staff Patrick Toner decided to go full-time at Franciscan University, Caroline Morton was also hired by CUF, and Ducie Maria Silva decided to return to California to be with her mother.

In Zanesville, Robert was ready



to start almost immediately as our new director, and the Lord brought us two other very experienced staff members: Debbie Lovensheimer as Executive Assistant and Debi DiVenti as Membership Specialist (and for those who understand, both Deb's received roses as confirmations). As I type, they are all on board, and I can hear their voices working through all the issues and procedures to make this move as uninterrupted as possible.

I knew this whole process—which took less than two months compared to our anticipated six—was worth it when we had our first staff meeting yesterday morning...the first complete staff meeting the CHNetwork has had under one roof in over five years. And the most important part about this was being able to pray together. Thank you Lord!

> But lest I forget, though, the one remaining staff member who is unable to enjoy the benefits of this united office environment is lowly Chris LaRose up in northern New York. It would certainly be great to have him here, but I am confident, given the nature of his unique work as the director of the Helpers Network and our e-mail discussion lists, that he can continue to do this from his home office.

But we do have much to do—to keep up with phone calls, bushels of mail, buckets of email, and an increasing wave of book and tape orders, as well as the continuous influx of inquiries from

non-Catholics interested in coming home to the fullness of the Catholic Faith.

As far as finances are concerned, your generosity has continued to amaze me. Thank you! But since this move has forced us to incur some major moving and setup expenses, I would only encourage you to continue to be just as faithful and consistent (I want the new staff to be able to focus their every effort on the needs of the growing apostolate without worrying about whether the funds will be there for their next paycheck).

But ultimately, why have we made this course correction?

Because as I've mentioned before, we have a long-term direction that guides, empowers, and enriches our work. We look to the year 2017 as a very significant target, for on October 31 of that year, non-Catholics will be celebrating, with world wide festivities, conferences, and publications, the 500th anniversary of Luther's posting of his Ninety-five thesis on the door of Wittenberg Abby—the beginning of the reformation. At that point several theologians and priests made what they believed were necessary course corrections for the Church, which have led to thousands of separate Christian traditions sailing in different directions.

We have the next seventeen years to do all we can, together with God's assistance, to help our separated brethren recognize this momentous day not as a day to celebrate the schism but to seek reparation and unity. From there we look forward to the many other 500-year anniversaries that celebrate the other divisions of Christendom. May we together be constant and faithful witnesses to our separated brethren so that more and more will come home to the fulness.

Providentially (that is to say, in answer to our prayers for the *CH*-*Network*), new facilities and new personnel appeared on the scene near Zanesville, while all but one of the Steubenville staff members went on to other work. The new director and the executive assistants bring a wealth of experience to their new responsibilities.

privilege to offer Mass in the new *CHN* headquarters near Zanesville, with special intentions for the new personnel and the apostolate of the Network. I am very thankful for this uniting of our forces, confident that it will enable us to minister much more effectively to the members of the *CHNetwork*.
