Over a hundred converts and reverts have been able to tell potentially 700 million people around the world about the beauty, the joys, and the fullness of the Catholic Faith!) And in reciprocal manner I must admit that without the increased exposure of the Journey Home program the CHNetwork would not have been able to survive financially. God has richly provided through your generosity.

I am very thankful that God has allowed me to have this undeserved privilege. Thank you for your prayers and constant support. I pray that with God's grace—I can continue to

represent both the *CHNetwork* and the *Journey Home* faithfully.

WHY 2K?

In less then four months Y2K will have arrived. So also, the climax of a wide divergent range of proposed biblical and Marian apocalyptic scenarios.

Before I converted to the Catholic Church six years ago, the only futuristic prophesies I was aware of were the numerous biblical verses that pointed to the eventual Second Coming of Christ. Every year as a pastor I preached at least one sermon on I can guarantee that Jesus is coming again in your lifetime—if not in the clouds with the great sounding of the trumpets, at least at the very moment when you die—which can happen at any moment. Are you ready? My strategy of course was to turn their attention away from the continuous sprouting up of doom-and-gloom voices who were hawking some new theory (and usually a new book) purporting an imminent day and hour. I wanted to turn their focus towards the more important, imminent issue of whether they were ready at that present moment to stand before God "without embarrassment." I still have on file somewhere the little book which all of us pastors received in 1987 entitled "88 Reasons Christ will Come Again in 1988." Christ didn't come. Which led the author to



publish another book with a corrected date for 1989. I've not heard of the author since.

But unexpectedly, becoming a Catholic only increased my horizon on apocalyptic scenarios. Sadly, many Catholics give a welcome ear to the speculations of Protestant apocalyptic received numerous emails on these issues from recent converts.

Second, upon conversion we immediately discover many exciting new things about the supernatural and the communion of saints that we were ignorant of before. We hear of Eucharistic miracles and the incorrupt

writers, who teach millennialism and the Rapture, which Catholics are specifically called to reject. But many Catholics are also enthralled by the messages of hundreds of supposed visionaries who claim private revelations from the Father, Jesus, the Blessed Virgin Mary, St. Joseph, and other saints. Others are convinced that the Masonic order, the Illuminati, and other conspiracy groups are manipulating our government, our Church, our country, even our world, towards a New World Order. And then in the midst of this arose the Y2K millenium bug,

Now what has all this got to do with the work of the *CHNetwork International*? Actually, quite a bit for several reasons.

First, those of us who swam the Tiber from a mixture of Evangelical, Fundamentalist or mainline Protestant backgrounds bring with us a host of apocalyptic baggage. It isn't always readily apparent how we now as Catholics are to take this stuff. Especially when we encounter Catholics who are avid fans of Hal Lindsey or those best-selling apocalyptic novels by Tim Lahaye. What must we leave behind and what can we continue to hold as valid? I have bodies of deceased saints. We hear of the supernatural and ecstatic experiences of saints, such as St. Francis of Assisi and St. Catherine. And we discover that the Church has given approval to at least eight modern apparitions, like Fatima, Lourdes, and Akita. We also hear, as well, of an increasing number of new claims to private visions and messages. Those who take these messages very seriously envision a futuristic imminent apocalyptic scenario including a Warning, a Miracle, a significant Ecclesiastical Event leading to a major schism in the Church, followed by a devastating Chastisement, and ending with an era of Peace.

Because we now recognize how impoverished we had become due to our Protestant skepticism towards the supernatural and private revelations, we can become by the same token very open to these new views of our imminent relationship with Mary and the Saints. We can also become quite receptive to views that see the Church reft with dissent and error, and that She / we are in just need of the Chastisement that soon awaits us. How should we take all of this? How do we keep a balance? Where is the authoritative voice in all this?

A third reason is that because there are many conflicting opinions among life-long as well as convert Catholics as to how one should answer the above questions, the resulting disunity of opinion can appear as just one more check on the list of those who see the supposedly unified Catholic Church as terribly disunited. I know personally several very sincere, bright, well respected Catholic authors and speakers who are so divergent in their views on these issues that they in fact consider each other near heretics! I also know Catholics who will take the word of a private visionary over the decision of the local Bishop. How do we explain this confusion to potential converts who are looking for authority, truth and unity?

Now I do not purport to be a prophet, nor an expert on apocalyptic literature and theories. Therefore, I cannot say with certainty that all or any of these theories are wrong. It could certainly be in the Father's plan for Jesus to return on the stroke of twelve midnight January one in the year two thousand. But I do know that the Church has strongly reminded us that Jesus said that no one knows the day nor the hour except the Father. So we are not to get anxiously caught up in apocalyptic scenarios that claim a specific time of his coming. The Church's Magisterium, as well as respected and revered saints such as John of the Cross and Teresa of Avila. have also warned us not to base our faith on private revelations, but on the official teaching of public revelation.

So, as far as all the religious apocalyptic scenarios, I can only wait upon the Lord, be ready at any time for His coming, and wait on His Spouse, the Church, to guide us in our preparation. (With that in mind, I strongly encourage you to read Pope John Paul II's Papal Bull on preparing for the Jubilee Indulgence.)

But all this said, I believe Y2K is a

horse of a slightly different color. There is more than enough reliable and readily available information out there to explain what Y2K is, why it came about, and why it may cause drastic problems for our future. I have tried to stay balanced on this—limiting my research to voices I can trust. and avoiding those whom I believe have a hidden reason to push their doomand-gloom scenarios. I have listened to reports by government agencies, economic institutions: read dozens of articles in the major national and international publications; I've talked with experienced programmers-both secular as well as religious. I've listened to the arguments from all sides: from those who believe Y2K is way over blown and will be a non-event, to those who believe it will cause minor but short-term inconveniences. to those who believe it will eventually lead to a major recession if not a depression, and finally to those who sincerely believe it will lead to a total and permanent disruption of the world as we know it.

My conclusion is that I just do not know what problems Y2K will cause in our lives. But I do believe Americans in general are being much too complacent about it. I have come to the conclusion that our lives and our economy will be adversely affected by the increasing ramifications of Y2K.

Just this morning I received an email from Lane Core. Jr., a convert and member of the *CHNetwork*. He is a computer programmer and a wellrespected columnist on Y2K issues (His web site is http://users.sgi.net/~elcore). When I receive an email from Lane, I always listen because his information always indicates that he has done his homework. Today he sent me an article Ronald Elwing bv (IntellectualCapital.com) entitled "Y2K Madness and Campaign 2000." It began as follows:

Will the current Congress be

remembered for its \$792-billion tax cut? Not a chance, says veteran journalist Arnaud de Borchgrave. In August, de Borchgrave told a national radio audience that no one would remember anything about the 106th Congress except its failure to warn the nation about the risks of the year-2000 computer bug.

De Borchgrave spent 25 years as a senior editor at Newsweek before becoming editor of the Washington Times and then president/CEO of United Press International. He also has been associated with the Center for Strategic and International Studies at Georgetown University, where he has been vice chairman of the Y2K Risk Assessment Task Force.

He is not the sort of Y2K alarmist who sees the U.S. electrical grid failing at midnight, Jan. 1, 2000, and the rest of our technological systems failing in rapid succession. But he argues that the United States will, over a period of time, suffer collateral damage from the breakdown of outdated, uncorrected computer systems in other countries and the introduction of destructive viruses through the Internet. "It is not a question of one thing going wrong," De Borchgrave says on the task force's Web site. "It is a question of tens of thousands of things going wrong."

How should this change our thoughts or plans about the future? I CANNOT speak for anyone else but for my family and myself. Everyone's situation and circumstances are uniquely different.

But I do feel that I am obligated to say at least something to you, my friends and companions on the journey, and especially to you who have supported this apostolate with your generous donations. As the co-author of a book about Y2K (*Millennium Insurance*, Basilica Press) and the host of a special on EWTN entitled "Why 2K? Countdown to the Jubilee," I would consider it very dishonest if I didn't address this issue with you about Y2K and the future of the *CHNetwork*.

The short of it is to say that we are keeping a forward-looking approach, as I believe we should all also take for our families. In the short term, we are making basic preparations for various kinds of outages Y2K may cause, but we are not putting our future on hold. We believe that through whatever trials may be ahead, God is with us and leading us.

As Jesus commands us in Matthew 6.34, we are not to worry about tomorrow; we are not to base our future plans on fear. Rather we are to trust in the Lord for tomorrow and acknowledge Him in all our ways (Proverbs 3.5,6). I believe this boils down to planning with hope, not fear. This is in fact the focus of John Paul II's constant emphasis as we look forward towards the Jubilee. He doesn't say there won't be trials; he just says to trust and hope with joy. As Jesus illustrates, God takes care of the sparrow. But we all know how hard sparrows and other animals have to work to survive. It's a both / and: trusting that God will provide, yet doing all we must to do responsibly to provide.

For the *CHNetwork*, the short term involves making sure all of our computers are ready, and our financial statements are accurate and well documented.

For the long term, we actually have some very exciting goals. Our focus is on a very important date in the future: October 31, 2017. This is the 500th anniversary of Luther's posting of his 95 Thesis, which will most likely be a well-publicized and celebrated day for our Protestant brethren. The goals of the *CHNetwork* for the next nineteen years focus around doing all we can to help our separated brethren discover the fullness of the Catholic Faith so that this future date will be a date of reparation and reunification. We have a lot to do in the next 18-plus years, but Lord willing, we can work together to discern many ways to communicate the truth of the Catholic faith to our separated friends and family.

As far as Y2K, let's pray with hope that our Lord will be merciful. For those of you who are interested in finding out more about Y2K and how one might prepare, both physically and spiritually, let me encourage you to order the book Millennium Insurance: A Christian's Guide to Y2K and How to Prepare Wisely For It (Basilica Press, 1999). Four of the five authors are converts and members of the CHNetwork (Dave Palm, Scott and Kimberly Hahn, and myself), and we tried to present a balanced, more spiritual perspective. Being sensitive to the accusations that those who warn about Y2K are doing so to make money, we are offering this book at basically our cost (an \$8 donation covers shipping/handling), with any residual profit going directly to the CHNetwork. Please let me know your thoughts as you read this book.

Also, the program I hosted on EWTN entitled "Why 2K? Countdown to the Jubilee" will air eight more times in October and November (see p. 1 for times). This 1 ½ hour special also featured three convert members of the *CHNetwork* (Kimberly Hahn, Dave Palm, and Steve Wood) plus the resident theologian of EWTN, Colin Donovan. Again I look forward to your comments about this program.

Two other urgent issues I need to bring to your attention. We are

presently working on the Jul-Sep. edition of the CHJournal with the theme Sola Scriptura, and we need your articles. Remember that the Journal is one of the primary "outreach" tools of the CHNetwork. It contains articles written by converts to express the truths of the Catholic faith to our separated friends and family—in a winsome way and in language with which they are familiar and comfortable. So if you have anything already written or would like to write something on some aspect relating to Sola Scriptura, please pass it along ASAP. Thanks.

Also, we will be having our most recent **Regional Gathering** this coming November 19-21 at Marytown, Indiana. More details will follow in this newsletter, but I just wanted to mention it here to encourage you to consider attending.

All the above has been to say that though we are not oblivious to the concerns of Y2K nor without preparation, we are also not being distracted from our primary calling. I am very inspired and challenged by the following words on working for God from *Friends of God*, Homilies by Josemaria Escriva:

Many people begin, but few finish...only work that is well done and lovingly completed deserves the praise of the Lord...the fullness of Life that God rightly expects from His children means that they have to have a careful concern for the quality of their everyday work, because it is this work, even in its most minor aspects, which they have to sanctify... if the fact that God sees us were fully impressed on our consciences, and if we realized that all our work. absolutely all of it is done in his presence—for nothing escapes his eyes-how carefully we would

finish things and how differently we would react! This is the secret of the holiness which I have now been preaching for so many years. God has called on all of us to imitate him. He has called you and me so that, living as we do in the midst of the world—and continuing to be ordinary people!—we may put Christ at the top of all honest human activities.

Even this morning as I responded to the concerns of a another Presbyterian pastor who is struggling with the implications of his heart's desire to convert to the Catholic Church, I am reminded that God has much work yet for us to do. Please keep us in your prayers, and thank you for your continuing support.

Recently the *CHNetwork* received an inquiry about married priests. A man asked what it would take for a married Baptist minister to become a Catholic priest. He went on to say that in Texas he has heard of former Episcopal and Lutheran clergy who had been ordained to the priesthood. He wondered also whether "a married Mormon preacher" could ever become a Catholic priest.

We regularly receive inquiries like this from Protestant clergy who are giving some thought to becoming Catholic and who are wondering what a future in the Catholic Church might hold for them. Given the wording of this e-mail, I assumed the man was a Baptist minister looking seriously at the Catholic Church.

The substance of my reply to the man's question was this. I know of a small number of former Presbyterian, Methodist, and Lutheran clergy, and a much larger number of Episcopal clergy who have been received into the Church and then eventually received dispensations from celibacy allowing them to be ordained as Catholic priests.

The matter is entirely at the discretion of a man's bishop. All of us married former Protestant clergy who have been ordained as Catholic priests have sought this privilege because we believed that, as we entered the Church, we had a continuing vocation to ordained ministry. By God's grace, our bishops were also convinced that we had this type of vocation and were willing to help us fulfill that calling. Without their active support we could not have applied for consideration for this privilege.

The practice of allowing married clergy converts to apply for dispensations from celibacy and for ordination began almost fifty years ago in Europe. So far as I know, all the applicants there were converts from Lutheranism. In 1980, at the request of the American bishops, the "Pastoral Provision" was announced for this country. The Provision dealt only with former Episcopal clergy, simply because there were so many of them who after coming into the Church had petitioned their bishops for consideration as future Catholic priests.

Applying for dispensation from celibacy is simpler for Episcopal clergy converts, but only because the Pastoral Provision has provided a clear-cut procedure. Any of our bishops are free to consider a clergy convert from any Christian tradition as a candidate for the application process. In my reply to the inquiry about married priests, I neglected to speak directly to the question of whether a Mormon preacher could apply for dispensation. Mormons are not Trinitarian Christians. (That phrase, of course, is redundant: to be Christian is to be Trinitarian, and vice versa.) I do not know how the Church would respond to a Mormon clergy convert's request for permission to apply for ordination.

Addressing my correspondent

directly, I said, suppose you are a Baptist minister (I assumed he was) and you are drawn to the Catholic Church. There is only one sound reason for becoming a Catholic: to realize that the Catholic Church is the one true Church founded by Jesus Christ; that she speaks with his authority; that only within her communion does one have full access to all the means of grace which Jesus Christ intends his followers to have.

Once one comes to see and accept these facts about the Church, he is obligated under God to act on that knowledge and enter the Church.

It would be wrong, I told the inquirer, for him to become a Catholic if his primary motive were to become a Catholic priest. He didn't say this was his motive, but I wanted to make an important point. Whether he could ever become a priest is quite irrelevant to the question of whether he should become a Catholic.

Should he allow the Holy Spirit to draw him into the Church, and, after coming in, should he raise, with his bishop, the question of ordination with dispensation from celibacy, his bishop would probably tell him to live in the Church for a while. He would need to get his feet on the ground, spiritually and doctrinally speaking, before seriously discussing the matter of ordination. No bishop would make a commitment to support a man's application to Rome for dispensation

Dear Members and Friends of the Coming Home Network,

Recent changes and current activities at the Coming Home Network have kept us busy.

Our two previous office assistants, Molly Growden and Susannah Brown, have moved out of the Steubenville area. Molly is currently residing in Washington D.C. where her husband is attending the Catholic University of America. Susannah was hired as the Director of Residence Life at Ave Maria Institute in Ann Arbor, Michigan. They have been a great service to the *CHNetwork* and they leave with our prayers and hopes for future success.

The transition in replacing them was somewhat of a setback in our day to day office duties and in responding to your requests. However, it did provide the opportunity to analyze and revamp some of our procedures. The influx of email, letter, and phone correspondence is constantly on the increase, especially since the CHNetwork's 800 number is now being posted on the television screen during the Journey Home program on EWTN. Since we envision an even greater increase in correspondence, we have taken this time to improve our office organization and the managing of our Helpers Network.

To meet these growing needs, the *CHNetwork* has hired a full-time **Executive Secretary, Heather Keimig.** Heather is a convert from the Presbyterian Church of America. She received her undergraduate degree in Human and Organizational Development from Peabody College of Vanderbilt University in Tennessee, and is currently attending classes parttime at the Franciscan University of Steubenville. Heather has excellent organizational and communication skills. She will be assisted by two parttime office assistants provided through the services of The Ridgefield Group. We believe the team we are building will be more effective and punctual in addressing the needs of members and inquirers, for the pursuit of the mission of the *CHNetwork*. To assist the Catholic *Church in fulfilling Her mission of evangelization and its call for Christian unity as proclaimed by Pope John Paul II: "That They May Be One."*

Though our Helpers Network is growing, we still need more convert and revert volunteers, most especially clergy converts whose own journeys have equipped them to best assist others who now find themselves on the same road they traveled. Our helpers correspond principally through email, but also by phone and letter. An impressive academic CV is not necessary to participate. Sometimes what are most needed are words of encouragement and support; other times it is answers to doctrinal or apologetic questions. We try to assign each inquirer to a helper with similar backgrounds. It's a unique opportunity participate in the New to Evangelization! Here are two excerpts from letters that show the joy and fruit of those already involved:

From a Protestant on the journey home: "Hi!! Just read your email. I received the information you sent me yesterday- what a great gift! As to the length of your emails, you couldn't write long enough for me to tire of them. I love it. I am so impressed that the Coming Home Network has someone as diligent and as well-spoken (written) as you are..."

From one of our helpers: "As for [the other revert I was helping], she is doing great and is now even evangelizing other fallen away Catholics to come back to the Church. We keep in constant touch and she's doing great on her journey – even bringing her pastor and his wife along with her to the Church."

and ordination until he saw the man settled down in the Church and came to know him rather well.

I ended with these words: "Your letter implies that you are bring drawn to the Catholic Church. If I correctly read the implication, I urge you to follow the guiding of the Spirit and concentrate on the basic matter, which is coming into the communion of Christ's Catholic Church. Once you come home, so to speak, and have *lived* in your home for a while, then you can begin to pursue the matter of ordination."

The man's response to my e-mail reminded me of the experience of a little boy who came in from play and said, "Mom, I have to ask you a question. Where did I come from?" His mother said to herself, "This is *the* moment I've been waiting for." She sat the boy down and began a rather detailed, twenty-minute lecture on human reproduction. Again and again he tried to interrupt her, but she asked him to wait with his questions until she finished. Finally, she said, "Now, does that answer the questions you've been trying to ask?"

The boy said, "Well, Mom, not really. Tom and I were playing and he told me he came from Cincinnati. Where did *I* come from?"

Here's why this story came to mind. My inquirer thanked me for my answer to his question. Then he told me why he had written. He needed the information for his work as a Catholic journalist writing for a diocesan paper.

What the mother told her son was true, but irrelevant to his inquiry. What I wrote to the Catholic journalist is true. I hope he found it relevant.
