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"To Believe in Christ Means to Desire Unity; To Desire Unity Means to Desire the Church To Desire Unity; T

About five years ago, I submitted for your consideration a summary of how we understood the *raison d'etre* of *The Coming Home Network*. This then became buried somewhere in the middle of *Journeys Home*. Given how much we have grown in the years since, it seems timely to represent this statement, slightly revised and updated, for your consideration and prayers.

Simply stated, the Goal of the *Coming Home Network International* is to help reverse the deleterious effects of the Reformation. This may seem a bit audacious or presumptuous, but having spent the first forty years of my life fanning the flames of autonomy, I would like to spend the next forty, God willing, promoting healing and unity.

Although the Catholic Church of the sixteenth century was certainly in need of renewal, the methods and innovative theology introduced by the Protestant Reformers led instead to schism, disunity, and confusion. Nevertheless, God always "works all things for the good of those who love God and are called according to his purpose" (Romans 8.28). Those that left the Church continued to follow Christ with sincere hearts and with particular devotion to the written Word of God. They built churches and denominations and established standards of faith designed to lead their followers toward holiness and salvation. This fact is clearly stated in the Catechism of the Catholic Church, quoting the Vatican 11 "Decree on Ecumenism":

The ruptures that wound

the unity of Christ's Body-here we must distinguish heresy, apostasy, and schism—do not occur without human sin ... However, one cannot charge with the sin of the separation those who at present are born into these communities [that resulted from such separation] and in them are brought up in the faith of Christ, and the Catholic Church accepts them with respect and affection as brothers... All who have been justified by faith in Baptism are incorporated into Christ; they therefore have a right to be called Christians, and with good reason are accepted as brothers in the Lord by the children of the Catholic Church.

Furthermore, many elements of sanctification and of truth are found outside the visible confines of the Catholic Church: 'the written Word of God, the life of grace; faith, hope, and charity, with the other interior gifts of the Holy Spirit, as well as visible elements. 'Christ's spirit uses these churches and ecclesial communities as means of salvation...whose power derives from the fullness of grace and truth that Christ has entrusted to the Catholic Church. All these blessings come from Christ and lead to him, and are in themselves calls to 'Catholic unity.'

'Christ bestowed unity on his Church from the beginning. This unity, we believe, subsists in the Catholic Church as something she can never lose, and we hope that it will continue to increase until the end of time. 'Christ always gives his Church the gift of unity, but the church must always pray and work to maintain, reinforce, and perfect the unity that Christ

does not cease praying to his Father for the unity of his disciples: 'that they may all be one. As you, Father are in me and I am in you, may they also be one in us, ... so that the world may know that you have sent me. 'The desire to recover the unity of all Christians is a gift of Christ and a call of the Holy Spirit. (Catechism, 817 820)


We in the *Coming Home Network International* see these words as our charge, recognizing that the work of unity is primarily the work of Jesus Christ, for as He said, "apart from me, you can do nothing." The *CHNetwork* desires only to be a channel of His grace, responding to whom the Holy Spirit is calling to listen to the Catholic Church and come home.

We believe this work of ours together is a grand and blessed work, in keeping with Pope John Paul II's statements in his encyclical, *Ut Unum Sint* ...

The unity of all divided humanity is the will of God. For this reason he sent his Son, so that by dying and rising for us he might bestow on us the Spirit of love. On the eve of his sacrifice on the Cross, Jesus himself prayed to the Father for his disciples and for all those who believe in him, that they might be one, a living communion. This is the basis not only of the duty, but also of the responsibility before God and his plan, which falls to

the death of his Son, has broken down the walls of division? Division "openly contradicts the will of Christ, provides a stumbling block to the world, and inflicts damage on the most holy cause of proclaiming the Good News to every creature.

The Lord of the Ages wisely and patiently follows out the plan of his grace on behalf of us sinners. In recent times he has begun to bestow more generously

upon divided Christians remorse over their divisions and a longing for unity. Everywhere, large numbers have felt the impulse of this grace, and among our separated brethren also there increases from day to day a movement, fostered by the grace of the Holy Spirit, for the restoration of unity among all Christians ... This unity bestowed by the Holy Spirit does not merely consist in the gathering of people as a collection of individuals. It is a unity constituted by the bonds of the profession of faith, the sacraments and hierarchical communion...

For the Catholic Church, then, the communion of Christians is none other than the manifestation in them of the grace by which God makes them in his own communion, which is his eternal life ... To believe in Christ means to desire unity; to desire unity means to desire the Church; to desire the Church means to desire the communion of grace which corresponds to the Fathers plan form all eternity. Such is the meaning of Christ's prayer: 'Ut Unum Sint.' (Ut Unum Sint, 6 9)

To this end, under the maternal intercession of Mary, Mother of the Redeemer, and the paternal care of St. Joseph, do we in the *Coming Home Network International* dedicate our lives.

An Often Difficult Journey


When I first began my duties with the Coming Home Network as Assistant Director, helping clergy converts, I mailed surveys to each clergy member in order to obtain : better grasp of the challenges and needs of Protestant ministers seeking membership in the Catholic Church This month I would like to share with you some of the struggles that many ministers experience as they journey home to full communion with the Catholic Church. The following comments were extracted from some of the surveys recently returned by our primary members.

Sometimes the individual merely needs to muster up enough courage to take the final plunge:

"I consider myself an exiled Catholic and refer to myself as a Lutheran Catholic. I accept and acknowledge the Holy Father, Pope John Paul II, as the Head of the Church and I consult the Catholic Catechism daily on what the Church teaches & believes. I accept Dominus Iesus as a true and accurate statement of the relation of the Catholic Church to the rest of Christendom."

Others have personal and family problems to surpass:

"I am a United Methodist minister, though I am Catholic in heart. I follow Catholic devotionals: Rosary, Liturgy of the Hours, Adoration, etc. Many lay Catholics as well as priests are my



divorced me. I remarried before my knowledge of the Catholic Church. My wife refuses to get an annulment from her previous marriage. So I remain a Catholic in heart but am unable to convert unless my wife changes her mind."

Still other ministers experience barriers created by members of the Church herself:


"I am a Moravian minister. I have been unable to enter the Catholic Church. My efforts in making contact with Church authorities were rebuffed. Despite my profession of belief in Catholic truth, no interest at all was shown in me. I was looked upon more as a potential problem than anything else. My wife was ready to follow my lead and that of the Lord into the Church, but now she has some hostility toward it because of the cold reception I

received." also

"I attend Mass infrequently. The priest, though, does not want to cause trouble in the local community by having me (a Presbyterian minister) in church. Even so, I do attend a monthly men's

group from the local parish with many C members."


A r e v i e w Patrick Madrid's, "Search and Rescue."

The Holy Father's repeated call for "the new evangelization" is his response to the fact that a great proportion of mankind has not yet received the gospel of Christ. If Catholic consciences can be stirred as indeed they must be stirred to take seriously each person's responsibility to evangelize, the question will arise, "How?" Few of us have had experience in evangelizing lapsed Catholics and non-Catholics and non-Christians. Heretofore there has been scant Catholic literature which truly helps us to learn how to be effective evangelists.

But now we have available an excellent handbook of instruction and resources and guides to training for would be envangelists. Patrick Madrid's new book, Search and Rescue, is aptly subtitled, How to Bring your Family and Friends Into – Or Back Into – the Catholic Church. Drawing on the wisdom of some of the saints of evangelism and on his own wide experience, Madrid leads unskilled evangelists step by step in acquiring both competency and confidence in proclaiming Christ to those outside the communion of the Church.

Madrid gives helpful counsel concerning the virtues a person must develop in order to evangelize effectively. He discusses a prayerful attitude, absolute trust in God, humility, perseverance, regular and honest examination of one's motives, and above all, love. He urges readers to listen sympathetically to persons they are evangelizing. Hear them out, he says, in order to learn what keeps them away from the Church, what their questions and arguments are.

For each of his chapters Madrid provides questions for self-examination; positive actions to take (what he calls "search-and-rescue action agenda"); and an appropriate prayer. He



person fabout one is concerned; a weekly holy hour in the presence of the Blessed Sacrament, imploring Christ to flood the person's heart and mind with grace; and a fast

from one meal a week in behalf of the person to whom one seeks to minister.

On-the-job training is also outlined in *Search and Rescue*. At the end there is an extensive annotated bibliography designed for pesons of varying proficiency in apologetics and scripture. It is divided into three phases, preliminary, intermediate and advanced.

The final and perhaps most important chapter is entitled, "Let God Do the Heavy Lifting." Madrid reminds his readers, "you must always remember that, despite your best efforts to evangelize (as well as despite your worst failures), God's Providence is always active, directing on the path of grace the person you're trying to bring home." (220) He ofers further encourgement in the words of a prayer attributed to St. Jerome: "It is our part to seek, his to grant what we ask; ours to make a beginning, his to bring it to completion; ours to offer what we can, his to finish what we cannot." (207)

From the Directors Desk

Dear friends of the Coming Home Network,

I hope you had a good summer. It sure did go fast, didn't it?

In July, I took the family on a week long vacation in the Smokey Mountains and had a wonderful time. The scenery was great, and we left very relaxed.

One thing that I observed, however, was disturbing. It appears that Catholics are viewing their Sunday obligation for Mass not as a necessity but as an option while they are vacationing. We have been going to this little church about once every two years for the last 12 years, and although the number of visitors to the area remains high, the Catholics attending Mass while vacationing seems to be dwindling.

Is this part of the new age of "indifferentism"?

What is indifferentism? Are not all religions good? Is one not as good as any other?

These questions voice "the most popular religion of our time": the religion of indifferentism. It is the inevitable reaction of the false principle of many Protestants; "Faith alone without works will save".

The person who preaches "indifferentism", declaring God is indifferent to truth, simply because he himself is indifferent, is the same person boasting a religion free of constraints, restraints, and obligations and rejects the true church,

which requires absolute faith and enforces it's laws under the penalty of possible damnation.

Strange, isn't it, that the very man who worries night and day over worldly matters, which will end in a tick of the eternal clock, will sacrifice eternal happiness for that one "moment in time" as it were.

The assertion that "one religion is as good as another" is a contradiction. It is the first principle of reason that two contradictory statements cannot be true. If one is true, the other must be false. Either there are many gods or there is one God; either Jesus was the son of God, or he was not; either Jesus is truly present in the Blessed Sacrament, or he is not. Therefore, to declare that all religions are equally true, is to deny truth altogether.

Recently, a Priest from California made this statement in an interview:

"One of the things that I have seen not only in the Catholic Church but other churches is the change from having fear of God to being aware of God's love. . . We're all in this thing together, it's all the same thing, whether we are Jewish or Buddhist

holic. We have to ople who love one other and I think hat's the message hope the last twenty years we have been giving."

Isn't this he indifferentthat created the

terpretation of Vatican II, which has had a profound effect on many Catholics today?

Yes, knowing Gods' love is great, wonderful, and necessary,

but it should be coupled with, not a replacement for the fear of God.


So, you might ask, how do we battle this age of indifferentism? In my opinion, as I stated in a recent friendly discussion with a local Priest, I see our obligation as good Catholics to accentuate that which is special to the faith. Yes, we don't deny that which we have in common with Protestants, but many "nominalistic" Catholics want to downplay everything that is not common with the Protestantism.







" (Thomas a Kempis) As moderator of our daily email discussion list, a common subject is how to deal with our non-Catholic family and friends. As committed converts or reverts to the faith, we desire unity withGod and our loved ones, just like Jesus does in John 17. In this month's featured resource, Search and Rescue by PatrickMadrid, we read some reasons why non-Catholics stay away from the Church: 1) misconceptions about the Church; 2) prejudices against the Church; 3) genuine disagreements with the Church;4) suffer from the 'I'm not being fed 'syndrome; 5) and some hide the real reasons for leaving or coming in. For this last group, we must listen to what they're not saying, listen with your heart, and let God's grace show you how to respond to unspoken issues.

Here are some comments on this from our email list:

I have only been Catholic since last Easter. My wife and children are still en-route. I pray constantly that they, moved by their own consciences, will join me soon. None of my friends, my wife, read John 17:21-23 the way I do.... The way I read it is that Jesus *cares* DEEPLY about actual physical bodily institutional unity,



'...May they be brought to complete unity to let the world know that you sent me and have loved them even as you have loved me.' In other words, it leads me to consider very seriously the Catholic Church's claim to be the 'location' where this unity exists.

By my action, I "broke fellowship" in a fundamental way with the members of my immediate circle. But, again, I see 'not acting' as lukewarmness and indifference, and ultimately disobedience.

My friends simply will not consider the Catholic Church's claims at this point...I tend to think its simply because they cannot suffer to even *think* of themselves as Catholics in the future, because of the anti-Catholic propaganda they've suffered...my wife attends Mass with me now and then, but does not want to be put in a position where she must refuse the grape juice and wafer at a Church of Christ service, were we to attend one with her parents.

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
